ODKM Advising Notes

Cohort Schedule:

- All ODKM students should plan to follow the set cohort schedule (fall-spring-summer-fall). Any student needing to deviate from the cohort schedule should contact both his/her academic advisor and the ODKM program director as he/she runs the risk of delaying graduation significantly.
- The ODKM program reserves the right to rearrange the sequence of classes at any time.
- Unless otherwise specified, Friday classes meet from 5:00pm – 10:00pm. Saturday and Sunday classes meet from 9:00am – 5:00pm.
- Because the ODKM program follows a specialized cohort schedule that differs from the traditional University semester schedule, add/drop deadlines for ODKM courses are unique. To determine the specific registration-related deadlines for your ODKM courses, please refer to the Office of the Registrar's website and the part of term code for your course (click on the course's CRN in PatriotWeb to determine the part of term code).

Registration:

- Due to the cohort nature of the program, ODKM courses are not available for public view on Patriot Web, and are thus not accessible via the "search for classes" option. ODKM students must register by directly entering the CRN of each course section. This information will be provided by your academic advisor.

ODKM 740: Learning Community

- ODKM students participate in this course each semester, but do not register for it until their final semester in the program.

Full-time vs. Part-time:

- Full-time students in the School of Public Policy must enroll in a minimum of 9 credits (3 courses) per semester. Part-time students typically enroll in 2 courses per semester.

Elective Options:

- The ODKM program usually offers one ODKM-specific elective course each summer. Students, however, may take a different elective course (an SPP study abroad course, another course offered in SPP, etc.) if approved in advance by their academic advisor.

Study Abroad Opportunities:

- Any SPP-sponsored study abroad course may be taken to fulfill the ODKM elective requirement.

Professional Internship:

- Students with less than two years of public policy oriented work experience are required to complete a professional internship. A waiver of this requirement must be explicitly requested via: http://policy.gmu.edu/portals/0/pdfs/Academic_Policies_and_Forms/internshipwaiverpacket.pdf.

Academic Requirements:

- Students must maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative grade point average to graduate.
- Students may apply up to six credits of "C" toward graduation.
- A student is terminated from SPP if he receives a grade of "F" in a single course. A student is dismissed from the University if he receives two grades of "F" and/or a grade of "C" in nine or more credits.
- Students must complete all requirements within *six years* of the date of initial enrollment as a degree-seeking student.
